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The phrase structure rules of Grammar 5

For sentences:

$$\left[\begin{array}{l} \textit{phrase} \\ \text{SYNTAX } \textit{sentence} \end{array} \right] \rightarrow \left[\begin{array}{l} \textit{word} \\ \text{SYNTAX } \textit{noun} \end{array} \right] \left[\begin{array}{l} \textit{word} \\ \text{SYNTAX } \left[\begin{array}{l} \textit{verb} \\ \text{RIGHT } \langle \rangle \end{array} \right] \end{array} \right]$$

$$\left[\begin{array}{l} \textit{phrase} \\ \text{SYNTAX } \textit{sentence} \end{array} \right] \rightarrow \left[\begin{array}{l} \textit{word} \\ \text{SYNTAX } \textit{noun} \end{array} \right] \left[\begin{array}{l} \textit{phrase} \\ \text{SYNTAX } \textit{verb} \end{array} \right]$$

For verb phrases:

$$\left[\begin{array}{l} \textit{phrase} \\ \text{SYNTAX } \textit{verb} \end{array} \right] \rightarrow \left[\begin{array}{l} \textit{word} \\ \text{SYNTAX } \left[\begin{array}{l} \textit{verb} \\ \text{RIGHT } \langle \boxed{1} \rangle \end{array} \right] \right] \left[\begin{array}{l} \textit{word} \\ \text{SYNTAX } \boxed{1} \end{array} \right]$$

The last rule says: a verb phrase consists of a verb word that wants the category C after it + a word of that same category C.

Two tiny changes (in red) to rule 1 and rule 3

For sentences:

$$\left[\begin{array}{l} \textit{phrase} \\ \text{SYNTAX } \textit{sentence} \end{array} \right] \rightarrow \left[\begin{array}{l} \textit{word} \\ \text{SYNTAX } \textit{noun} \end{array} \right] \left[\begin{array}{l} \textit{word} \\ \text{SYNTAX } \left[\begin{array}{l} \textit{verb} \\ \text{RIGHT } \diamond \end{array} \right] \end{array} \right]$$

$$\left[\begin{array}{l} \textit{phrase} \\ \text{SYNTAX } \textit{sentence} \end{array} \right] \rightarrow \left[\begin{array}{l} \textit{word} \\ \text{SYNTAX } \textit{noun} \end{array} \right] \left[\begin{array}{l} \textit{phrase} \\ \text{SYNTAX } \textit{verb} \end{array} \right]$$

For verb phrases:

$$\left[\begin{array}{l} \textit{phrase} \\ \text{SYNTAX } \left[\begin{array}{l} \textit{verb} \\ \text{RIGHT } \diamond \end{array} \right] \end{array} \right] \rightarrow \left[\begin{array}{l} \textit{word} \\ \text{SYNTAX } \left[\begin{array}{l} \textit{verb} \\ \text{RIGHT } \langle \boxed{1} \rangle \end{array} \right] \end{array} \right] \left[\begin{array}{l} \textit{word} \\ \text{SYNTAX } \boxed{1} \end{array} \right]$$

The last rule says: a verb phrase consists of a verb word that wants the category C after it + a word of that same category C.

But, once we do that, we no longer need rule 2

Phrase structure rule for sentences:

$$\left[\begin{array}{l} \textit{phrase} \\ \text{SYNTAX } \textit{sentence} \end{array} \right] \rightarrow \left[\begin{array}{l} \textit{word} \\ \text{SYNTAX } \textit{noun} \end{array} \right] \left[\begin{array}{l} \textit{word} \\ \text{SYNTAX } \left[\begin{array}{l} \textit{verb} \\ \text{RIGHT } \diamond \end{array} \right] \end{array} \right]$$

Phrase structure rule for verb phrases:

$$\left[\begin{array}{l} \textit{phrase} \\ \text{SYNTAX } \left[\begin{array}{l} \textit{verb} \\ \text{RIGHT } \diamond \end{array} \right] \end{array} \right] \rightarrow \left[\begin{array}{l} \textit{word} \\ \text{SYNTAX } \left[\begin{array}{l} \textit{verb} \\ \text{RIGHT } \langle \boxed{1} \rangle \end{array} \right] \end{array} \right] \left[\begin{array}{l} \textit{word} \\ \text{SYNTAX } \boxed{1} \end{array} \right]$$

The last rule says: a verb phrase consists of a verb word that wants the category C after it + a word of that same category C.
